

Advanced Search: Many platforms offer advanced search options, allowing you to refine your search by date range, author, article type, and more. To enhance your search, use Boolean operators like "AND," "OR," and "NOT" to combine or exclude specific terms.



HOW IT WORKS This tool takes the titles, subjects, and approximately the first 100 words from a subset of search results. The topic for 'Illinois' might bring up expected connections from the text like 'Chicago.'

Term Frequency: View search result over time by entering a word or phrase, comparing multiple terms if desired. By clicking on a point on the graph, retrieve search result for that year or, by clicking and dragging, select a time period to zoom in on.



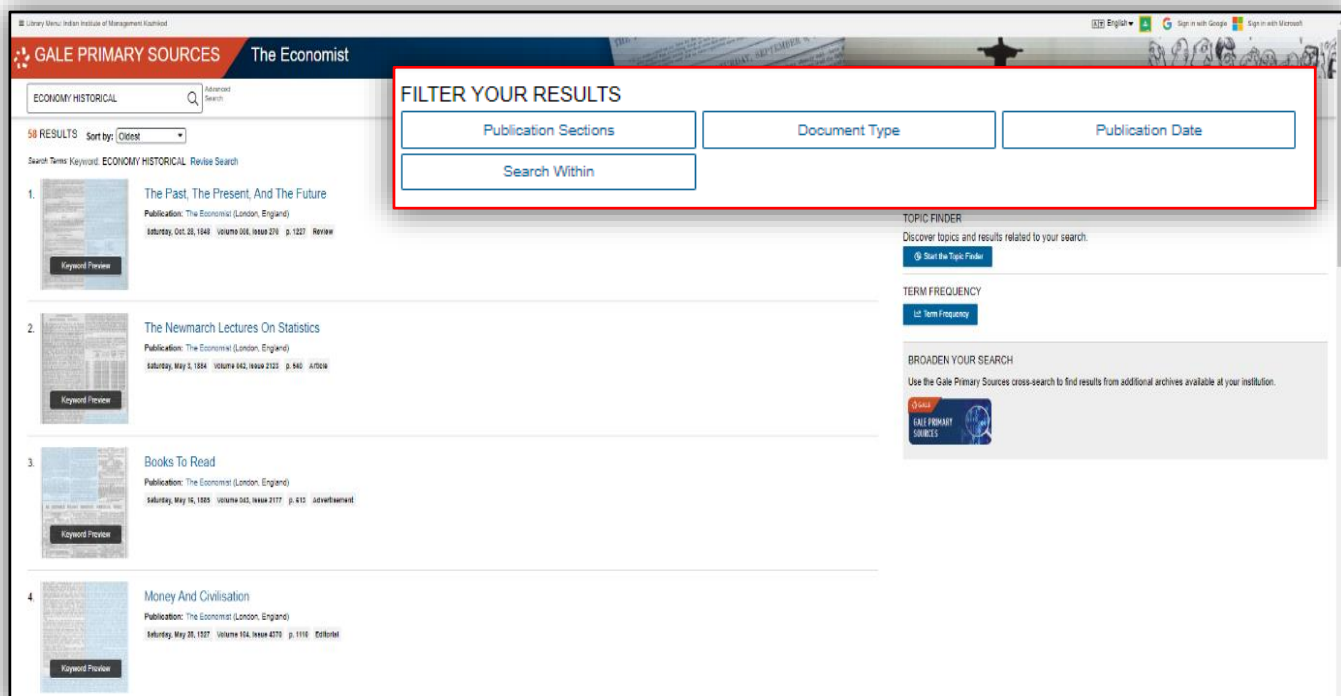
Year Range: - Frequency Popularity

Researchers can see the frequency of search terms within content sets to identify central themes and assess how individuals, places, events, and ideas interact and develop over time.

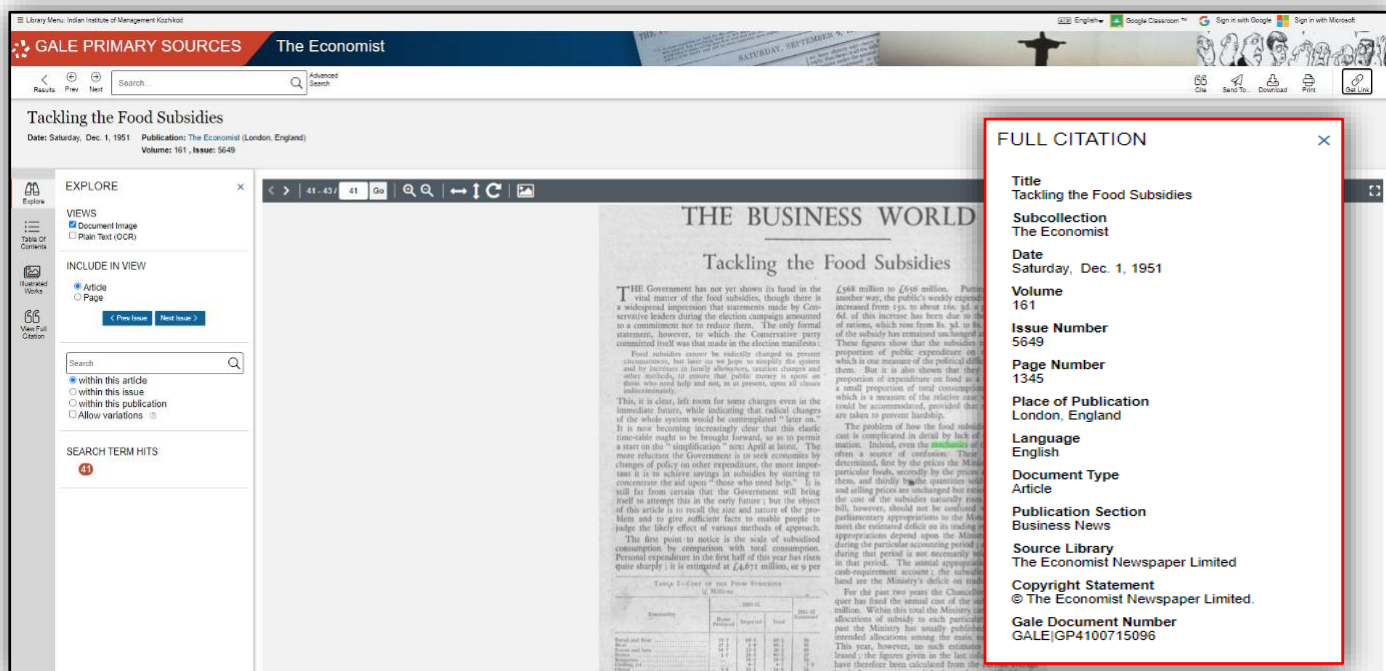
Percentage of Documents By Year, 1843-2020

Citation and References: Make sure to cite articles or content you use from EHA properly. Each platform may have its preferred citation format, but common elements include the article's title, author, publication date, and the name of the archive.



Viewing and Downloading Articles: Once you find an article of interest, you can typically view it online or download a PDF version for offline use.
